



Jaguar: white, gray, black, golden brown, however all have spots.






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The jaguars you tend to see are yellow and tan, or goldenred tan. These can be called tawny colored also. Probably 98% of jaguars are these colors.	We are working at making a list of what colors of parents produce what colors of cubs. This will help both zoologists out in the field, and people working in zoos, to have information.	
A black male father jaguar with a black mother jaguar Can have a black baby. Also can have a tawny colored	Tawny (orangeish-brown or yellowish-orange-brown) father with solid black mother Two cubs are both spotted	Same parents (tawny jaguar father with solid black mother) can also produce a relatively black cub.

Typical tawny colored father jaguar with a tawny color mother jaguar will obviously, normally, produce a tawny colored cub.	We do not yet know what kind of cubs will result from black male father jaguar + tawny jaguar colored spotted mother jaguar ???	A jaguar specialist, A. Lopez, working in Latin America, has found a "pseudo-melanistic jaguar that had dark black rosettes on a dark brown background."



Some jaguars of Guatemala are black; others are gray; very rarely are white.

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


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




